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

District of Thunder Bay





TBDSSAB Housing Goals and Strategic Outcomes

- To effectively address the provision of Social and Affordable Housing through Direct-Owned Properties, and relationships with Housing Providers.
- To seek to meet the needs and well-being of tenants.
- To reduce homelessness and eliminate chronic homelessness.



Housing Services Act, 2011

- Eligibility for social housing is based on financial need.
- * "Rent-geared-to-income" assistance means financial assistance provided in respect of a household to reduce the amount the household must otherwise pay to occupy a unit.
- Focus on independent living.
- Does not include Supportive Housing, Retirement Homes, Nursing Care Facilities.



Housing Challenges

- Housing waitlist of 1,030 applicants
- High rates of domestic violence
- Increasing mental health and addiction issues
- Increased security costs
- Increase in damage repair
- Chronic Homelessness





Homelessness – A Snapshot







Homelessness In the District of Thunder Bay

Survey 474 respondents - 2 days

- *66% Indigenous
- ❖ 7% Veterans
- **\$6.5% LGBTQ2S**
- *37% spent time foster care and/or group home
- 462% were not originally from Thunder Bay
- 461% experienced homelessness before 25 years of age



Homelessness in the District of Thunder Bay

Gender identification

- *63.5% male
- *35.2% female

Common factors for homelessness

- *33% Addiction or substance use
- 12% conflict with spouse or partner
- 11% unable to pay rent or mortgage
- ❖9.9% unsafe housing

Chronicity

- ❖59% 6+ months
- *21% homeless 3 or more times



Homelessness in the District of Thunder Bay

- Self reported health conditions
 - 70.9% Addictions
 - 48.9% substance use increased since being homeless
 - 45.4% mental health
 - 45.1 chronic or acute medical condition
 - 31% physical disability
 - 14.6% experience all four above




Home for Good Initiative

- Call for proposals 2017
- Creation of a tri-organization working group
 - Examine local needs and context
 - Examine relationship between housing instability and mental health and addictions supports/services
 - Leverage expertise of each organization
- Develop service model
 - Organization roles and responsibilities
- Create partnership agreements




Home for Good Structure





Components





Targeted Identification

- TBDSSAB Transitional Outreach and Support Team
- Dedicated staff to go out in the community to find homeless individuals to link with program
- Build relationships with various homeless population serving organizations



Prioritization

- Conduct an assessment of identified homeless using the Service Prioritization and Decision Assistance Tool (SPDAT)
 - ❖ The SPDAT is an evidence-informed approach to assessing an individual's or family's acuity. The tool identifies the areas in the person/family's life where support is most likely necessary in order to avoid housing instability.
 - Potential for baseline evaluation
- Ontario Native Women's Association (ONWA) also conducts SPDAT assessments and will refer names to TBDSSAB.
- Individuals are placed on the High Needs Homeless prioritization category where their SPDAT score is in excess of a predetermined level.



 - Ceremony, traditional rights of passage, activities, access to Elders



Trends

- Addictions, Housing, Financial Problems have been the most presenting issues noted on referrals
- Clients housed in rent geared to income units

Pressures

- Low contact due to transient lifestyle
- Affordable housing on the decline

Next Steps

Seek continued/permanent funding for existing program and expansion



The Lodge on Dawson 1460 Dawson Road, Thunder Bay





The Lodge on Dawson

- Provides transitional housing, supports and services to individuals struggling with chronic homelessness, addictions, and mental health challenges with the focus on stabilization in a trauma informed environment.
- Voluntary program
- 30 bed facility with shared accommodations
- ❖Male and female adults (18+)



The Lodge on Dawson

- Medically stable
- Meet the criteria for high support housing needs (SPDAT)
- LOS: several weeks to months, depending upon individual needs (no longer than 364 days)
- Opened October currently 15 residents housed



Staffing and Supports

- On site 24-hours, 7 days per week
- Nursing (RN, RPN), Community Support Assistance staff 24 hours
- Social Workers (Monday-Friday)
- Support of Physicians during designated Clinic times
- Supervisor
- Supports include Cultural activities, Leisure life skills, psychoeducational groups offered by partners and community resources
