

WOULD YOU TAKE A Chance?

CLIENT A

- Female; no criminal record, mental health with anorexia at an earlier age
- In receipt of assistance on and off for 4 years – left for employment but laid off
- Grade 12, drivers license but no vehicle
- Enjoys working with seniors, had some volunteer experience

CLIENT B

- Male, 'labelled' client, no criminal record and no addiction issues
- In receipt of assistance 12 years; prior on parents ODSP budget, still living at home
- No Ontario Secondary School Diploma
- No drivers license, no work experience
- taught self to weld with help of Uncle

WOULD YOU TAKE A CHANCE?

CLIENT C

- Male, 39 years of age
- On assistance since 2008; no earnings deducted; no break in service except when in jail (all OP's)
- Life long criminal record; but by no means a hardened criminal
- Lives in a rural area and has no transportation but can stay at his mothers

CLIENT D

- Female, off and on assistance since a child (on and off reserve too) ; involvement with the child welfare system
- No secondary school diploma
- No work experience
- No criminal record
- Found in non-compliance



WHAT HAPPENED WITH THE FOUR CASES?

CLIENT A – completed program but with attendance issues; found employment but turns out there were underlying addiction issues; came to trust staff and is working on the repercussions of addiction as she now has seizures and unexplained memory lapses... Exit to Employment CLIENT B – Welder working for Local 800 red seal and been off assistance since 2010 – makes a six figure salary

CLIENT C – finds the Gig economy works for him; all legally obtained earnings are declared though very sporadically, and he engages in more employment information activities, feels that his record makes him a target and if he comes to town he is guity by association.

CLIENT D – Client completed culinary program; exited to employment; domestic violence; on assistance but working part time in the culinary field learning about boundaries and self esteem actions so her daughter will break the cycle of violence
