

# Dufferin County by the Numbers

## Cold Hard Numbers “Homeless”:

78 people - October 2016 first ever count *(Joined 20,000 Homes Campaign)*

44 people – May 2018 second count

25 people – May 2019 By-Name-List

32 people – January 2020 By-Name-List

23 people – April 2021 By-Name-List

18 people – August 2022 By-Name-List

43 people - October 2023 By-Name-List

31 people – February 2024 By-Name-List

# Dufferin County by the Numbers

Numbers “Housed” Outflow:

39 people - 2019

56 people - 2020

57 people – 2021

86 people – 2022

90 people – 2023

25 people – 2024 *(up to March 31st)*

Don't look at data sets in a vacuum.....

- *Look at your data 'inflow' and 'outflow'. Each time your data changes, what is it telling you?*
- *Consider environmental and system changes e.g. policy, process, funding, staffing, stock, population, seasons, weather ..... fatigue !!!*

# What Reduced Homelessness In Dufferin?

- **Put Money in the Right Place**
  - costs more to keep people in the homelessness system than to house them
- **Diversion, Diversion, Diversion**
  - identify immediate alternative housing arrangements (even when/if there is capacity in the shelter system)
- **Data Informed Decision Making**
  - By-Name List (BNL) - when it shifts it is telling you something
- **Housing First Approach**
  - prioritize providing permanent housing with minimum conditions or barriers

# What Reduced Homelessness In Dufferin? (Cont.)

- **Heavy Emphasis on Supports not just bed stays**
  - mental health and addictions – 80% of those on BNL disclose they have a mental health or addiction challenge, get health !!!
- **Increases in Funding**
  - federal and provincial increases and the realignment of municipal funding (several layers of government)
- **Improving Coordinated Access**
  - more collaborations and Partnerships – Coordinated Access Table (CAT) meet every week, no wrong door approach and collaboration on the emergency motel program

# What Reduced Homelessness In Dufferin? (Cont.)

- **Help for Landlords**
  - recognize that many who now rent are not landlords by design, more by necessity, what do they need? Created a position dedicated to Landlord support
- **No more money**
  - you will never have enough, what can you repurpose or move? Realigned existing money into Housing Allowances, i.e. longer term support is better than short term band aid
- **Access to Housing**
  - more access to Community Housing by creating a BNL Priority on the Community Housing Centralized Wait List, diverted HPP money to create Supportive Housing



# St. Thomas-Elgin BFZ-C Milestones




# St. Thomas-Elgin By Names List

(TOTAL)




## ST. THOMAS

# The INN

## 24/7 Low Barrier Housing Focused Emergency Shelter Services

- **40 Beds (Congregate and Flex Spaces) + 10 Overflow Spaces**
- **Community Collaboration**
  - Canadian Mental Health & Addictions Thames Valley: Housing & homelessness system navigation, access to short-term recovery and supportive housing beds
  - Central Community Health Centre: On-site Physician and Nurse to deliver primary care and access to Sublocade
  - Ontario Works: Income & ID Replacement
  - Housing Stability Services: Social housing applications, access to rent supps/allowances & housing finding support
- **Shelter Breaks, Vs. Restrictions**
  - If our guests aren't here, we can't help and support them
- **Amnesty Bin Program**

Police Interventions are Down!  
Housing Outcomes are UP!

# What it Takes to End Homelessness

- Mindset and Leadership – Bias for Action
  - Reducing homelessness will take continuous effort
- Resiliency, hope and community collaboration is critical to this work
- Use your data to make strategic funding decisions and funding advocacy efforts that align with reductions in homelessness
- Get curious about your By-Name Data. Asking questions will lead to improvement ideas
- Housing AND Supports will end homelessness
